Abstract: Washington's support for Taiwan has been fortified in recent years by a variety of legislations; however, many of them—although public—are hardly known. Professors Antonina Luszczkiewicz and Patrick Mendis will discuss how the United States can support Taiwan directly and indirectly—by influencing other UN member-states—through a strategy of enticements and impediments to shape their policies toward the democratic island-nation.
